Those whose term expires except Bill Hooter have agreed to be nominated for another term. We thank Bill for his valuable inputs during his 4-year tenure on the board and wish him luck on his future ventures. Member Claudia Beane has agreed to be nominated for election to the board. Those officers presently in office are willing to continue for another year if elected to the board. Those interested in running for an office or elected as a trustee-at-large should contact Gerry Treichler. All known candidates will be presented at our October meeting for information purposes. The actual election will take place at our Annual meeting on Nov. 20. Additional nominees can be made from the floor at that meeting. NEW BUILDING- The new building is just about complete as far as we can go using available funding. Now that the custom measured sprinkler heads have been delivered, George Slocum and his crew of sprinkler system trainees will come back for their installation and to finish the job with a final pressure check to make sure there are no leaks.

Available special funding has allowed the kitchen floor and ceiling to be completed. Chairman **Bill Sterner** and his committee have met for final planning and estimating for specific items needed to complete the kitchen when funding becomes available. These include kitchen cabinets, shelving and the "island". We have estimates for the big-ticket items of the hood and fire suppression system for the kitchen and the furnace and air conditioning system for the main hall. Visiting Hours at our Schoolhouse Museum will change from between 2 to 4 PM every Sunday of the month to the first Sunday of the month for the winter months beginning Dec 2. Of course, we are planning our annual Christmas party with goodies and singing to our 100-year old pump organ at the Schoolhouse for Dec. 2 with the possibility of former board member Monica (Woodworth) Briggs returning to play the organ.

FARM MUSEUM, Linda Jackson, Curator and Bonnie Haskell, Assistant Curator- Here we are again at the end of another great year. Without the help of so many volunteers this would not have been possible. Many hours are put in behind the scenes with cleaning, putting away donations, recording, picture taking, etc. Thanks to all who have donated items for our museum in the past and for your continued support. Our farm museum will continue to be open all Sundays from 2 to 4 PM and all Wednesdays from 1 to 4 PM through October 14 or by special appointment. We received many fine comments from our visitors during our normal opening times as well as special group tours. Those that attended our farm museum festival were astonished to see that there

It helped to have the work days the same days that the work release workers were at the farm for their help in weed whacking and taking care of the previously planted trees, Rose of Sharon bushes and flower gardens and shrubs planted around our buildings. We are in the process of purchasing 2 more memorial trees and markers to be placed by the new building as a memorial to Marie and Wilson "Bud" Townsend, parents of President Gary. For your information, our charge for purchase and planting a tree is \$350, which also includes an engraved granite memorial stone placed by the newly planted tree.

SANBORN-LEWISTON FARM FESTIVAL-Our 2-day, 8th annual farm museum festival was the best ever with many stating how much they enjoyed our farm museum. The added space and restrooms provided in our new building helped make it easier to host our pancake and French toast breakfasts and our basket auction than in previous years. The International Harvester Collectors NY State Annual meet was held at our festival this year and they took part in the tractor show and the tractor parades conducted both Saturday and Sunday. We had a great program with plenty of food, baked goods, a basket auction, fine music including our very own Sanborn Fire Company Band, and a program by Terry Buchwald as "Elvis". We could not have done this without Chairman Linda Jackson and co-chairman Bonnie Haskell getting the planning off to an early start and the help of all 117 of you members with your family and friends working where needed plus additional numbers working behind the scenes making the delicious baked goods.

Historical Corner by Gerald E. Treichler The following are rememberances written by RE Casselman, an early pioneer of Sanborn. He came to Sanborn in 1912 and started the Sanborn Home Telephone Co.

I have mentioned before, few people realize the every day changes that take place in a community,

When I came to Sanborn Hoover had a store on the corner of Niagara and Buffalo streets, then the corner had a barber shop at the same location, then Gribben had a store there and now it is the residence of the Maacks.

So it goes from year to year the changes take place, at the time few notice but when you look back over the years some realize the changes are many and varied.

The count down of the passing years serves to pile up memories of those years that are gone. As I look back, I can remember when the well dressed man wore a derby hat, patent leather shoes and shirt with detachable collar.

As for the ladies, I can remember the long skirts, sailor hats with hat pins, shaker bonnets and the balloon sleeves, black lace gloves and high button shoes. Bustles and swim suits that were a cover-all.

Sir - those were the days.

There was a time when you were not dressed unless you carried an umbrella regardless of the weather, the gents used them as a walking stick and me-lady used them as just another fancy decoration. Along with top coats the umbrella was a must and if you had a nice one with a fancy handle it was best not to let it out of your sight for other folks did not mean to steal they just made a mistake and took home a nice new one in place of their old one.

Just before my wife and I were married I bought a very nice one that was a special, It raised by itself, you just pressed a catch in the handle and up it would go, and go it did. After we came here to Sanborn we went to some meeting one evening, and our umbrella kept right on going, I never saw it again. Sure umbrellas are still used but only when necessary, no more as a swagger stick or to protect Me-ladies wide brimmed hats with the wreaths of flowers on top.

Frank Campbell had a barbershop in the first floor of the Victor Barber building with two large windows in front. Along the front of the building was a row of trees just inside the sidewalk.

Charlie Mills, one of the first to try flying had secured a single engine old by-plane and had taken off up near the Falls in an attempt to fly to his Mother's home on the Baer Rd. Things went fairly well until Charlie got just West of Sanborn and ran out of gas, so he landed just South of the Hotel Barn, he landed O.K. but the plane which had no brakes kept right on going across the road and stopped with a bang against the trees right in front of Frank's barber shop.

Now in those days you did not see a plane every day, Frank, shaving a customer, glanced up and saw this frame on wheels coming at him was a bit more than Frank could take, he was so startled that it took him some twenty minutes before he could steady down and finish shaving his customer.

Back in 1917 was a very severe cold winter and along with the cold weather there was a shortage of coal. The Dealers here in Sanborn had none, and people went with teams to the Cities to secure a supply. I hired Mattie Barber to go to Lockport for a load, the weather was bad and he had a hard time getting thru, it took him all day and the team was tired out when the trip was over. Those were the days when you put the Auto away for the winter, that is if


you had one.

Back in 1917 the winter was very cold and there was a great deal of snow, roads were blocked in many places. Some outfit in Lockport equipped a large caterpillar tractor with a snow plow and started out plowing roads, this tractor had an upright open exhaust pipe and you could hear it coming for miles, it did a good job and could go thru the biggest of drifts, it surely was a welcome sight for many who could not get out. From then on, snow plows have been on the go every winter.

I came to Sanborn in 1912, it was about the first of October, days were getting shorter, and as there were no electric lights in Sanborn at that time, it was a dark town after sunset. Some of the stores had light other than old lamps but nearly all the homes had oil lamps, and if you wished to take a walk after dark you carried a lantern. I can remember seeing teams of horses and wagons go by with a lantern swinging underneath the wagon box. Once in awhile a buggy would go by with fancy side lamps. Every store had oil lamps, chimneys, wicks and of course kerosene oil. Some of those oil lamps are now valuable antiques. I still have the lantern which I bought that Fall.

Speaking of lanterns, I have a little brass lantern that my father bought in Wrightsville Pa. back in 1870.
