ANNUAL ELECTION

The annual election was held at our Nov. 27th meeting. Five Trustees from the five nominated were elected to the Board of Trustees. Bill Read, Bonnie Haskell, Jane Schultz, Joan Shaw, and Bill Sterner were re-elected to succeed themselves for a 3-year term. Also, Gary Townsend, Bill Read, Gerry Treichler and Glenn Wienke were re-elected as your President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer, respectively. Your officers as well as the Trustees making up the Board are presented on the previous page herein.

BUILDINGS

Naming Of New Building- The board at their December meeting had no problem naming their new

building in honor and the dedication of their President Gary Townsend. Gary has been our President continuously since 1998 except for the year 2000 when he was Vice President and Jim Cranston was President. Our new building will be called the Gary Townsend Hall or the Townsend Hall for short. We are now ready for dedicating the building, hopefully in the spring.

Townsend Hall Usage- Gary has appointed Bill Sterner as Hall chairman. Bill is in the process of preparing a member hall rental agreement for board approval. A rental agreement for non-members, if the board decides to go that way, will come later after we see how the member hall rental goes.

Museum Systems Maintenance-A systems maintenance schedule and trouble-shooting chart has been prepared covering both our Schoolhouse and Farm Museums. We have a big operation and have to take care of business. Hall chairman, Bill Sterner, Phone 417-2990 has primary responsibility and should be contacted by anyone noting any irregularities at our facilities.

LEGION BUILDING MOVE-

The moving of our Legion building to the farm is a "go" project. **Grant writer Bernie Rotella and Vice President Bill Read** did a great job in presenting our application to the Greenway Commission and then to the Host Communities. The Greenway Commission gave us approval as being consistent with their mission and the coalition of Host Communities gave us unanimous approval to receive a grant for the \$175,000 required to move the building. This includes funds for a foundation at the farm and modifying the building to depict a 19th century church with useum rooms at the rear. We plan to make the move in early 2015.

Plan to move Legion post wins funding

WHEATFIELD – Funding for a plan to move a 187-year-old Sanborn building last used as an American Legion post to the grounds of a farm museum was approved Tuesday by the committee that controls Niagara River Greenway funding in Niagara County.

The Host Communities Standing Committee unanimously approved the \$175,000 request from the Sanborn Area Historical Society. Society vice president William Read said work will begin as soon as the money is in hand.

Sanborn Post 969, American Legion, donated the building at 5866 Pearl St. to the historical society last year. The plan is to lift the building off its foundation and haul it to an old railroad track bed nearby and move it to the grounds of the society's Farm Museum at 2660 Saunders Settlement Road.

It won't be the first time the 40-100tby-25-foot wooden building has been moved. The society's funding application said the building was originally erected in 1825 or 1826 on what is now Cambria-Lewiston Townline Road, near the pass through the rock of the Niagara Escarpment known as the Pekin Cut.

It was originally used as a Methodist Episcopal church and later as a Presbyterian church. Sometime between 1865 and 1874, the building was lifted onto wooden rollers and pulled by horses from the hamlet of Pekin to Pearl Street in Sanborn; its steeple was removed at that time, but the Historical Society's restoration plan would erect a new one.

The building, called the Sanborn Union Hall, was used again by the Methodist Episcopal congregation. In 1888, a Mennonite congregation bought the hall and used it until 1936, when it was sold to the First Baptist Church of Sanborn.

The Baptists sold the building to a local woman in 1940, and the American Legion took over the structure in 1953.

The Legion removed the front steps and tacked on a 16-foot-by-25-foot addition.

Gerald E. Treichler, Historical Society secretary and Legion adjutant, said a set of steps inside the building and the restrooms will be removed on the new site, because the Museum has restrooms.

Read said the front of the structure will be set up to depict a 19th century church, while other historical exhibits will be placed in the rear of the building.

Treichler said the Legion post, which has 40 members, is now meeting in the Historical Society's schoolhouse museum on Niagara Street in Sanborn. Historical Corner by Gerald E. Treichler The following are remembrances written by RE Casselman, an early pioneer of Sanborn. He came to Sanborn and started the Sanborn Home Telephone Co. in 1912.

I came to Sanborn in 1912. Charlie Treichler had only a small greenhouse and grew carnations. Harry Treichler worked for him, in fact, with very little other help, Charlie and Harry did the work.

Charlie loved and had a great faith in flowers, as has been proven through the years. For with all the up and down of the flower market, the Greenhouse has grown and been enlarged several times, as well as being rebuilt after a large section of it was smashed by heavy snow.

The Charlie Treichler Greenhouses, now operated by two of Charlie's sons, Mark and Lloyd, is an outstanding symbol of a man's love and faith in the beauty of flowers.

Billy Pembleton was very much in evidence, especially at certain times. Billy was an Indian who, when thirst demanded, came to town and imbibed more than was at all necessary. When he started home he was a bit unsteady: so that he would have plenty of room he took to the center of the road. This was not a bad idea in horse and buggy days, for all those who knew Billy looked out for him and gave him plenty of room.

But with the coming of the auto there were many who did not know him and failed to go around. Billy was hit. He died of injuries suffered in the accident.

Billy meant no harm to anyone, he just liked to sing and talk to himself. Billy in his younger days had been places and done things, for Billy was a Rough Rider with

Teddy Roosevelt in Cuba. He always wore his Army hat with the yellow Cavalry Cord and was always glad to tell of his experience.

I Remember when by W. J. Pike as told to R. E. Casselman

When a young man, I well remember the little piece of woods back of our place as a popular picnic spot. Many outdoor religious meetings, too, were held there. It was much larger then and a really fine grove of maple trees. The Free Methodist Church of North America was organized at a meeting held there 100 years ago this Spring. The church organization

purchased a plot on Hoover road a few rods south of the original site of the meeting and have made it into a small but attractive park commemorating the centennial of their founding. Dedication services were held there on June 1lth, 1960.

My family moved to Sanborn in 1882, I went to school in a one room schoolhouse on the Saunder's Settlement Road at the corner of the Bridgeman Road. A year or two later a new schoolhouse was built on West Street. We were so proud of it! It was a two story building with a belfry atop that, and a flag pole in the front yard. It was built in the middle of a large lot and they planted evergreen trees on three sides of the property, sort of screening in the play yards, one on the South for the girls and one on the North for the boys. Those recreation grounds were really segregated. On pain of severe punishment you never crossed over to the wrong side. There were no fire escapes, just outdoor plumbing and the boys carried the drinking water from a well in the yard. Everyone drank out of the same dipper, unsanitary? guess it was, but it seems to me that measles, mumps, colds, and all the other diseases that plagued us then, spreads through the class rooms just as completely today. Fire removed that landmark during World War 2.
