

THE TOWNSEND HALL

The SAHS Board at a recent board meeting appropriately name our new building the **Gary Townsend Hall or Townsend Hall for short.**



Gary is very deserving of this honor. Soon after receiving the Architect's drawings through Advanced Design in Lewiston, Gary saw no need to pay their management fee and took over the job as Project Manager of the building program. This alone saved us a lot of money that was put to good use allowing us to complete the building with a great working in addition to the much need kitchen restrooms. With his business sense and his 22 years as Fire Control coordinator for the Town of Lewiston, he had the knowledge and contacts that allowed us to have this fine structure complete within the budget funded by the \$260,000 grant and extra \$16,000 provided by the Town of Lewiston. We are now in the process of getting ready for the dedication of the 5000 sq ft "Gary Townsend Hall" with its 2000 sq ft side porches.

Many have asked if we are going to rent out the building to other groups. As of now, we are working on a document that allows our members use of the hall. After this is in place for a while, we will see about renting it to others. We do not have parking available in the wintertime so we are unable to even use it for our own regular meetings since most are held during the winter months.


FARM BEAUTIFICATION: Joan Shaw, Chmn- (731-5653) assisted by Valerie Dumpleton

Historical Corner by Gerald E. Treichler-

The following are remembrances written by Ralph Casselman, an early pioneer who came to Sanborn and started the Sanborn Home Telphone Company in 1912.

I Remember when by Elmer Crosier as told to R. E. Caeselman

When I was a boy I went to school at the Baker District just East of the old homestead where Clarence Kline now lives. Some of the other pupils attending school at that time, were Herbert Crosier, Walter Baker, Fanny House, Walter Reidpath Ed. Baker, Geo Schuler, Lily Schuler and others.

Some of the teachers were, Emma Root, Jenny Baker and Lottie Kitchner.

The old school building was an old board building and the wind blew thru the cracks in Winter and it was almost impossible to keep the room warm, infact your dinner froze in the dinner pail.

IIRemember when by Elmer Crosier as told to R. E. Casselman

When my wife and I were married April 9th. 1896 at the home of my wife's parents, the Elijah Saxton's, there were some hundred guests present. The minister's name was Rev. Staples Porter of Warren Corners Methodist Church. All the guests that came, came in horse drawn rigs, and it was a real job to take care of all the horses. After the Ceremony a huge home cooked dinner was served, turkey, ham and chickens and all the fixens. Of all those who attended the wedding Alice McEwen, Alice Beeber and Bertha Crosier are the only ones still alive.

IRemember when by R. E. Casselman

I came to Sanborn to promote the organization and building of an Independent Telephone Company, in 1912, that fruit growers in this Northern section of Niagara County were still using teams of horses and wagons to haul their produce to market.

Starting at Pekin to the South the road had been improved to a black top, but was very rough, as the roads to the North were still dirt many of the farmers would use two teams of horses to haul their loads up the hills as far as Pekin or Sanborn, then go on from there to Buffalo with one team, taking nearly all night to make the trip.

In 1912 the year I came to Sanborn the following were some of the names of the Business men who were doing business here at that time:

Wm Pike, General Store and Post Office.

R. T. LeVan, General Store.

Hudson Bros., J.B. and B.L. Feed Mill.

Albert Wendt, Hotel.

Gus Doring, Farm Machine Supplies.

Wm. C. Ferris, Harness repair shop.

Wm. Richardson, Blacksmith Shop.

Charles Treichler, Small Green House.

Gus Latts was the operator in the N.Y.C. Station.
