WENDT FAMILY WINDMILL At the farm

Back in mid October after our windmill had been erected, SAHS received a **Notice of Violation** from the building inspector that we didn't have the proper paper work prior to putting up the windmill. After 2 meetings with the Town of Lewiston Arraigning Judge and at the second meeting with their Zoning Board of Appeals on March 12, we

were relieve that the ZBA, by a 3 to 2 vote, dismissed the requirement that SAHS needed a building permit to put up our windmill. Our lawyer, Joe Leone presented an excellent case, quoting town code, where in the windmill was considered to be part of a normal farm and didn't require a building permit as do other amenities added to our farm complex. This was after SAHS went through the time and expense of addressing the requirement at our first meeting with the ZBA to submit a design study conducted on the windmill base and for the tower itself. We all thank Joe for his very professional and Pro Bono work in our behalf!

FARM PROJECTS

We have many opportunities to keep us busy at the farm in addition to the many other projects that we are working on noted in this newsletter. Paul Jackson and his family are working on the Gazebo Project. spotted the Gazebo location and are now waiting for their drawing for our review and approval so that we can get a building permit. Bob Deull is working on the Parking Lot Project. Again, the Parking Lot location has been spotted. Bob is working on getting a couple of bids on cost so that we can seek funding. On other subjects, we have determined that our Cold Storage Building entrance is in need of repair soon or we will loose the front entrance of the building. Also, 2 of the plasticcovered greenhouses that we use for storage were seriously damaged by the snow this past winter and are in need of repair or replacement.

We now know what it takes to operate and maintain a farm. **SAHS** is fortunate to have members with the know how to get the jobs done. The main hold up in completing the projects is getting funding. **Your ideas are welcome!**

LEGION BUILDING AT THE FARM

The Legion Building Modification committee with **Bill Sterner** as chairman will be meeting at the farm on March 31. Now that the Legion Building has been moved and is on its foundation at the farm, the committee has the task of planning for the entryway with simulated church steeple at the north end and laying out the inside of the building with all to be at one level.. We are fortunate to have new board member Paul Calkins on board to help make key decisions needed to get our drawings updated and signed off by a PE so that we can get a building permit and the modification out for bids.

Joan Shaw has put together a possible layout drawing for a ramp for having the building handicap accessible. She needs this drawing approved so that her landscape committee can estimate the needs for making the building have a great setting in our museum complex. We understand that the Lewiston Lions Club has funding for this beautification effort after we submit our proposal. Joan says the funding and design required for the grading and ramp itself is not her responsibility but should be considered by the modification committee.

FARM LANDSCAPE & CONSERVATION: By Joan Shaw, Chmn-(731-5653)

The garden committee looks forward to another flower filled season for SAHS, both at the School House and Farm Museums. Plans for future landscaping around the Legion building are on the drawing board, but at this point it is difficult to predict how much can be accomplished in one season for that project. Meanwhile the committee will continue to coax a beautiful array of flowers from exiting shrubs and annual beds.

Last fall Leonard Wienke spent hours cutting invasive reeds that are choking the pond in the conservation area. He was able to cut most of the reeds, cutting as close to the water as his equipment would allow, but unfortunately these pesky phragmites have a nasty habit of growing into the water several feet, making it far more difficult to dig out the roots of those along the pond rim. This spring efforts will continue to remove the cut material left from last fall's cutting, and figure a way to smother the root systems of the cut plants.

This summer the committee inventory the conservation area to ascertain which areas are self- sustaining and which areas need intervention. This may turn into an on-going project. If anyone cares to help out with this, please contact me. To keep the Farm gardens looking their picture perfect best, we need volunteers to help with planting the annual beds and do a little bit of weedpulling during the summer. (It's not all work, and no play. We do have an enjoyable time as well) The Work Release workers do a wonderful job of handling the heavier projects. We will soon be starting our work sessions on farm beautification as weather permits. The committee with the help from the work release workers, will be doing spring clean up and plantings. We need your help so please come out when times are scheduled.

Historical Corner by Gerald E. Treichler-

The following are remembrances written by Ralph Casselman, an early pioneer who came to Sanborn and started the Sanborn Home Telephone Company in 1912.

When my wife and I came to Sanborn in 1912 and moved into the building which I now own, the building was not in very good shape, but it was the only place I could rent in which I could live in and also have the Telephone office. As I have stated before Mr. Ferris had a harness shop in the North end and they lived upstairs over the shop. The rest of the building was vacant so I rented the South section in which to live and have the telephone office.

There were no plastered walls, only boards and it was hard to heat in the winter, as at that time you had only stoves. As near as I can find out the building was build in 1868 of hand hewed timbers with 3 x 9 oak joist.

The first small magneto telephone switchboard was set up in what is now our front hall, the telephone exchange was started with fifteen subscribers with Gladys Dodge the first operator we hired at 20 cents per hour.

The Village Blacksmith "A Mighty man was he"

When I came to Sanborn in 1912, Richardson had a blacksmith shop on the corner just North of my building and Bert Robinson had a shop at Pekin and Ostwald had a shop at Bergholtz and there were many others at nearly every four corners for the Blacksmith was a very important guy, for the farmer depended upon him not only to shoe horses but to repair and make parts for wagons, buggies and farm tools. If your wagon broke down you could not buy a new part just anywhere, but there was a good chance that the blacksmith could repair it or make a new part.

Some blacksmiths were fine workmen and took great pride in there work.

The blacksmith played a great part in the development of our country.

I can remember when McKinley ran for President in 1896 on the Republican ticket and conducted what was known as a "Front Porch Campaign", his home was in Canton, Ohio and he stayed home most of the time and the railroads ran excursions to his home from all over the country. Those days there were torch light parades and lots of noise and you had to go to town to find out the news.

There were no phones, no autos, no radios, no TV or RFD. Also there were no so called "Farm votes", No women votes or religious votes, but there was a Veteran vote, men who had served in the Civil War of whom McKinely was one, a Major.

Wherever men got together there were lots of words and tempers were also very harsh.. One thing I especially remember about the campaign was a little jingle you heard everywhere, part of which was: 'Here comes another train around the bend loaded down with the McKinley men.

When I came to Sanborn inn 1912 I came on the train, one thing I noticed when I came from Buffalo to Niagara Falls was that the R.R. tracks ran along the East side of Webster Street in North Tonawanda,

Work was under way at that time to relocate the track to its present location. It does not seem possible today that a train could ever have run thru the street, but there were trains then every little while, passenger, freight and express, as the R.R. was busy all the time. I believe the abutments for the bridge across the canal are still in place.
