ANNUAL BUILDING

The annual election was held at our Nov. 26th meeting. Incumbent members Paul Beecher, Bob Deull, Hilda Snyder, Elaine Timm, and Gerry Treichler, were elected for a 3-year term and new member Dave Schmidt was elected for a 1-year term, (filling Bill Sterner's one-year term after his resignation), bringing our board of trustees to 15 members. Our duly elected officers for 2016 were Bill Read, Pres; Paul Calkins, VP; Glenn Wienke, Treas; Joan Shaw, Recording Sec; & Gerry Treichler, Corresponding Sec., each to serve for 1 year.

Your officers as well as the Trustees making up the Board are presented on the previous page herein.

STORAGE FACILITY

The 48' x 36' x 14' high storage building with its

1000 sq ft mezzanine is now complete. The items needed to be under cover over the winter months are now in place through the aid of the work release

workers. We even put the Allis Chalmers Gleaner Model E Combine donated by **Bruce Weinheimer** in the building. After last years harsh winter destroying our greenhouse temporary storage areas we needed this building fast. We thank one and all that donated

their time and money to allow completion of this building before the start of winter. The building cost \$47,744. About \$!9,000 is now being financed through our 6 ¼% Line of Credit account with the First Niagara Bank. The loan will be reduced by \$5000 after receipt of a grant through State Assemblyman **John Ceretto** promised in 2016. This will bring the amount owed to the budgeted amount of \$14,000.

We can not express our thanks enough to the Work Release workers from the jail for the help we receive around the farm for our fund raising projects, general maintenance and help with our special projects such painting the barn and gutting the Legion building in preparation for converting it to a church. They came out about 60 times to help us this past year.

LEGION BUILDING

A lot has been done on the Legion Building this last quarter of 2015. The drawings were finalized and put out for bid for the addition of an entryway with church steeple and a separate handicap entrance. Our thanks go to member **Dave Schmidt** for getting electricity run to the Legion Building.



Re-furbished wainscoating

There has been interior demolition of the building to remove the stairs and the walls & ceiling are stripped down to the plaster and lathe. The old wainscoting in the main room was found covered in

glue and layers of paint when removing the carpet from it. But the back of the wainscoting was the same finish pattern as the front. The wainscoting was removed so the back could be sanded, stained, nail holes filled and polyurethane put on it. The 310 plus boards will be stacked for reinstallation with the back side out next year. The nails holding the wainscoting were found to be the old square nails which would date the wainscoting to be from the 1800's. There was painting and reinstallation of the storm windows. There was also a lot of fill graded around the foundation with more grading work to be done.

PARKING LOT

Drawings have been prepared and bids received for a 100-car parking lot needed at the farm. We are in the process of going out for funding through grant writer **Bernie Rotella. Bernie** helped us receive grants from the Town of Lewiston for the Townsend Hall and the moving and restoration of the Legion Hall, using a portion of the Town's allotment from the re-licensing agreement with the Power Authority as authorized by the Greenway Commission.

LANDSCAPING & CONSERVATION by Joan Shaw

The number of people visiting, working, using, and attending events at the farm, grows substantially each year. The planning for parking areas, service roads, and walkways becomes increasingly important for traffic flow and access to various areas and buildings around the farm. All of this has a big impact on the visual statement the farm makes to the public.

Currently work is being done to extend the present service road to the new storage barn and Townsend Building. To that end truckloads of asphalt millings donated by the Town of Wheatfield were spread to form a base. With a borrowed payloader and the SAHS tractor, **Paul Jackson and Fran Haskell** spread many cubic yards of milling material into place. Millings are also being added to the service road along the eastern property line that extends back to the stand trees at the Boulder Ridge.

Meanwhile, over at the Legion/church building more truck loads of clean fill have been brought in to raise the grade in preparation for construction of the new vestibule, steeple and handicap ramp. All this earth moving will keep the Garden Committee busy planning and planting more landscaped areas in the spring.

These days increased attention is being paid to terms like "natural landscapes" and "wild gardens". This type of outdoor space is recognized as a means of helping to protect ever-shrinking plant, animal, insect populations around the world. The SAHS farm, with its beautiful acreage is ideally situated to contribute to a nation-wide effort to save and create more natural habitat landscape for people, birds and butterflies.

The SAHS farm possesses a 25' x 60' historic redwood framed, glass-paneled greenhouse which was built during the 1950's. It needs restoration, but until we can get the funding for this, it was covered with heavy duty plastic to protect it and render it serviceable for equipment storage.

Historical Corner by Gerald E. Treichler The following are remembrances written by RE Casselman (1886-1974), an early pioneer in Sanborn He started the Sanborn Home Telephone Co. in 1912

When I came to Sanborn in 1912 I came on the train, one thing I noticed when I came from Buffalo to Niagara Falls was that the R.R. tracks ran along the East side of Webster Street in North Tonawanda,

Work was under way at that time to relocate the track to its present location. It does not seem possible today that a train could ever have run thru the street, but there were trains then every little while, passenger, freight and express, as the R.R. was busy all the time. I believe the abutments for the bridge across the canal are still in place.

When I came to Sanborn in 1912 there were great piles of lumber for a long distance along both sides of the River Road as well as both sides of the R.R. tracks. Those days nearly all of the Lumber came down the Great Lakes by boat and was reshipped by rails. Some of these lumber piles had been stacked for a long time and were very dry. If a fire started this lumber would burn very rapidly giving off an intense heat.

Somewhere back in 1917 such a fire got started, my wife and I went with Mr. & Mrs. Frank Stover to see it. It was some sight to see I can tell you. The heat was so great that people could not get very close. One thing I remember was the R.R. tracks, the heat caused them to warp all our of shape, stopping all rail traffic, it was some two days before the fire could be put out and repair crews could relay the tracks.

I Came to Sanborn in 1912, Mr. Ferris owned the building which I now own. He had a harness shop in the north end where he did all kinds of repair work and also made new harness' at times he had so much work he had to employ a man to help him.

On the wall of his shop were rings, buckles and different kinds of odd ornaments used to decorate a harness, some owners of teams took great pride in the looks of their teams of horses and would buy many ornaments to give their teams a flashy appearance.

But the harness shop disappeared with the changing times and today it is hard to find where you can buy a strap, say nothing of a harness ornament.

I remember when there were no hardsurfaced roads in the county. Spring meant mud and more mud. It was a common sight to see teams of horses pulling desperately at a loaded wagon with its wheels sunk hub deep in the mud, on the Town Line road or any other road for that matter.

But about the middle of April, the mud dried up and work began on the roads. Every town had several "Pathmasters" the forerunners of our Highway Commissioners. They worked with ever changing crews for property owners were allowed to pay their road tax by working a day or two with the road gangs, and many of them did just that. Shovels and a horse drawn scrapper were the only tools available, but soon the roads were hard and smooth and a joy to go buggy riding upon. Soon however, there was dust, and horses hoofs and wagon wheels can make ruts and holes in dust as well as in snow and mud. Yes, then as now, it was a never ending battle to keep the roads in repair.

When I came to Sanborn in 1912, I came by Passenger train, as then there were four Passenger trains each way and if you wished to go to the city for business or shopping you drove a horse or took the train. Every train that stopped at Sanborn carried a number of passengers. Aside from the operator there were two other employees at the station to look after freight, express, mail and passengers.

During the first World War there were some 40 trains a day thru Sanborn. Passenger, Freight, Express, Tank Car, and Troop, of course all were pulled by steam engines, smoke, whistles and rattle, those were the days.

Harridine Bros, the Contractors who did the work on making the Pekin Cut and also build the road North to the Ridge and East along the Ridge road used an old type of tractor to haul wagons loaded with stone, sand and cement.

When the work was finished for some reason there were a number of these empty wagons at the top of the cut, the tractor operator conceived the idea of hooking these empty wagons together like train and hauling them back to headquarters at one time. The idea was OK but as the wagons had no brakes there was no way to hold the wagons going down the cut, about half way down the cut the push of the on coming wagons was to great, the train jack knifed and the on coming wagons not only piled up, but piled on to the tractor and the operator had to jump to save his life.

The Post Office was in Pike's Store and Frank McCann (Skip) met the trains, carried the mail from the depot to the office in a two wheeled cart or in the winter on a big sled.

Once in a while Skip would forget and go to the depot without the cart, both Pike & the Station Master had to explain to Skip that the cart was quite necessary to have along.

Skip and his cart was a common sight for many years and the mail went thru regardless of "snow or rain" but Skip was never in a hurry. Those were the days.

The years roll by and become so many that it seems impossible that there number is so

Just to name a few I can remember when the following were married:

Norm LeVan, Morris LeVan, Don Calkins, Lloyd Treichler, Wilbur Treichler, Ralph Treichler, Wallace Bush, Edwin Hoover, Howard Clancy, George Stover, Allen Flack, Francis Durffy, Jonas Haseley and many more. Seems like just about all the married people have been married in the last 50 years that I have lived in Sanborn.

The clock ticks and time moves on, the grains of sand in the hour glass of life run out.
