

Have you noted that **Cooper Signs** has completed installation of the new museum road sign? The LED back lighting of the sign has been connected to a timer in the electrical room in the Read Memorial building by **DeLorenzo Electric**. The sign takes power the equivalent of a 100 watt light bulb.

PARKING LOT, Paul Calkins, Chairman

The Planning Board approved the drawing provided by our engineer, Wayne Giambrone, in February. This was subsequently approved by the town board. We have now gone out for bids with the scope of work to include a 3-section stone parking lot for 90 cars, parking lot lighting, concrete sidewalk connecting the modified Legion building and the Townsend Hall, a 50 foot asphalt road entry area, asphalt parking areas along east-west road for handicap parking spots, widening and dressing up of the existing northsouth & east-west service roads to 20ft for fire access, and installation of a sewer line along west property line to be later extended by others and connected to a future county sewer line along Saunders Settlement Road. Bids are starting to come in.

LEGION BUILDING MODIFICATION, Paul Calkins, Chairman

Jay Wendt Contracting has completed the new front porch including a double door, and bell tower at the front, and a universal ramp to the handicap side entrance. Jay is under contract to install the drywall for the interior. SAHS with the help of work release workers has completed the inside electrical wiring and has purchased the light fixtures in readiness for installation after floor sanding, putting back the wainscoting and painting of the interior rooms is completed.

Historical Corner by Gerald E. Treichler-The following are remembrances written by Ralph Casselman, an early pioneer who came to Sanborn and started the Sanborn Home Telephone Company in 1912.

I remember when Mr. Richardson and Bob Warner had the Blacksmith Shop just north of my build1ng here at Sanborn.

From the time of the first settlers down

thru the years the blacksmith Shop was a necessity, horses must be shod, wagons and farm equipment repaired. It does not seem possible that the old shop with its smoke and dust and ring of the hammer or the anvil is no more.

There is much to be said of those old horse and buggy days that the youth of today will never understand.

As soon as you learned to drive a horse, you also learned patience and kindness for in dealing with horses you learned to take it slowly and anyone who was mean to a horse was a very low form of human.

Today a great percentage of the auto accidents on the road is caused by the impatience of the driver and when you smash your car, you are just careless.

When the auto pushed the horse off the road, it also curtailed important human virtues.

I cannot remember what year it was, but it was in the winter and we were having a very bad snow storm, when we heard an airplane flying very low over Sanborn. It circled several times and finally went down in the field on the south side of the road across from Jonas Haseley's home. I called the airport and trucks from there came for the people who were on board. We later found out that one time when they circled over Sanborn that it nearly hit Treichlers Greenhouse Chimney. We also found out the pilot did a very foolish thing in landing his plane as he did for he had a full tank of gas and could have flown out of the storm if he had taken off in a straight line instead of going in a circle. Also if that plane had landed a little further south it would have hit the big power lines and the chances were that all on board would have been killed, as it was no one was hurt.

I wonder if there are any who can remember the days when the "Tin Peddler" came around each summer.

I remember one who would come by our farm, he had a one horse, long box, light wagon and carried all kinds of tin ware. On sunny days he would hang many items on the outside of the canvas top and they would rattle as he drove. People were glad to see him come, his prices were low and he carried items that the town store did not.

Those days the housewife did most of the cooking in tin ware and the old "Tin Peddler" supplied many needed items used in the kitchen.

The "Cracker Barrel" caucus occurred two or three times a week at Pearce's store in Sanborn. There would be several men that drove into town in the evening to buy groceries or repairs for farm equipment. At Pearce's you were very apt to find Sam Treichler, Chas. Martin, Chas. Dodge, Frank Kline, Bert Tompkins, Truman Dean, and others.

Down at Pekin at Elmer Dale's store, you were apt to find John Maxon, Chas Mabon, Amos Mabon, Bert Stover, Art Baker, Vick McEwen etc.

Those were the days before Electric Lights, or Phones, or Televisions or radio and the men folks liked to get together and talk the price of eggs and how to run the Government.

I wonder if there are those who remember when you bought soda crackers the store keeper weighed up out of a barrel, for the time was when nearly all the items the store had for sale come in bulk.

The soda cracker was one and it was known then as a milk cracker, with the outline of a cow picture on it, it was round and when fresh was very good to eat. But along with many other items, it was hard to keep them fresh. Those days you had not heard of fancy moisture-proof packages, but on the other hand you did not have to contend with high prices.

Glifford LeVan lived in the house which has now been rebuilt into the Pekin Fire Hall. Mr. LeVan had a Green House at the rear of the building, he sold the place to Nicholson Bros. who enlarged the Green House and the one thing I remember about them was that they were the first in this section to raise sweet peas in the winter, as it was something a bit unusual they made a bunch of money the first year.

Elmer & I started for Sanborn and the snow banks were 4 or 5 ft. high over by Sam Treichler's. The road had been shoveled out only one lane and we got in there and met a team of horses, and as we had only one horse on the cutter Elmer had to unhitch the horse and turn the cutter around and hitch the horse on again and drive back as I stood up on the bank freezing.

He was going to an orchestra rehearsal, so there were horns, music racks, robes, blankets etc. That's the price we had to pay for a pleasant evening, 65 years ago.

Elmer used to hitch up a team of horses on a bob sleigh fill the sleigh with straw and we'd

start for Lockport to do our Christmas shopping which included dolls, doll buggy, candy etc.

We'd heat soap stones to keep our feet warm (they're up in our attic now), hold up umbrella to keep from freezing and start on an eight mile ride which took over an hour. -

We'd put the horses in at Hawks Livery Stable, take off our extra wraps and walk over the big Bridge to the stores and walk back with our arms full of Christmas gifts & warm clothing for Winter.

Some difference today, This was 65 years ago.

The "Church Supper" was the center of the social life of the church and the members of the church were 'supposed to attend.

It was and is a very important social aspect of the church, you meet other members of the church informally as well as those who are not members. The church soon becomes known as a friendly place by the type of "Church Supper" served.

Not only the older members but the young people learn to serve, to enjoy coming together and working together for the betterment of the community. -

The "Church Supper" may time never dim its importance. "

This last snow makes me think of the storm we had in April 1936.

It began in the afternoon about three and by five when men started to come home from work, the roads were blocked. Some who had started home were stuck in the snow and could not get thru". The two girls at the switchboard had a hard time getting calls thru, at times the Falls operator could not take any more calls as all toll lines were busy.

The girls handled 130 toll calls in one hour, it was a busy time and continued to be for the next two or three days. our time is the impatience of the general public especially our young people. A great many accidents on our roads where people are killed are caused by the impatience of the driver. Impatience, then speed, then death. Be patient, it is far better than hustle, bustle and bust.
