the artifact display cases and other subcontract work needed to outfit the museum finished their task. This information with the estimated cost of \$50,000 was provided to grant writer Bernie Rotella. Mr. Rotella will submit an application for a grant in our behalf as soon he finds an agency suitable for our application. Hopefully we will be ready to open the museum next summer after the floor covering is removed exposing the original wood floor. Plans are then to sand and refinish the floor; replace and refinish the wainscoting boards; put on the finish coat of paint; install the light fixtures; and setup the exhibits with the new display cabinets and artifacts. PARKING LOT PROJECT- Paul Calkins Chairman

The parking lot project using the \$200,000 Town of Lewiston Grant as approved by the Greenway Commission and host communities is looking good to be ready for this year's farm museum festival. The contractors have been selected and will soon have the 90 car stone parking lot complete with 4 each, 16 foot LED pole lamps; the installation of a sidewalk between the Legion/

installation of a replacement sewer line between the Townsend Hall and the sewage holding tank and an open ended sewage line between the holding tank and Saunders Settlement Road along our property line (for future hookup to anticipated town sewers) are also nearing completion. With the previously installed LED lighted road sign and dressing up of the farm lanes to a 20 foot width makes for a beautiful farm museum complex unforeseen 20 years ago when we formed our society.
