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PARKING LOT- Paul Calkins

The Parking Lot project is all but completed. We now have a new sidewalk between the Legion/Church Building with abutting macadam parking, a 90-car stone parking lot, a roadside sign, new farm roads and all farm roads widened to 20 feet, and a sewer line from the Townsend Hall ready for hookup at the road. SAHS has been informed by Town Supervisor Steve Broderick that the town has the funding needed to extend the town sewer line from Bridgeman Road to our property with completion expected in 2018.. This is good news since it will allow us to be open year around for all of our events.

Work on the sidewalk lighting and landscaping is under way as we go to press to finish the Parking Lot project. Jay Wendt, as low bidder, has been awarded the sidewalk lighting contract with SAHS furnishing the four posts/ lamps to be installed along the sidewalk between the Townsend Hall and Legion/Church Building. With this completed, we will have a useful and beautiful setting for our farm museum. Most importantly, we will have fulfilled all the requirements in accordance with the site plan prepared at the start of the Townsend Hall construction in 2010. At this time we thank all of our members who have helped above and beyond the call of duty and the Town of Lewiston for providing grant funding through their Greenway allotment to make this happen.

LEGION/CHURCH BUILDING-

The exterior of the Legion/Church Building after the installation of the chimney top will be complete. The rough electrical work and painting is nearing completion on the interior. The final projects to complete the interior are to remove the covering and refurbish the original floors; install wainscoting in the main hall; and complete installation of the light fixtures. SAHS will contact Senator Ortt to apply for a grant to help with expenses for the set up of exhibits in the building. Grant Writer Bernie Rotella indicated that his submittal of a grant for display cases is still temporarily on hold, and SAHS will be notified when the submission "window" re-opens.
