


ANNUAL ELECTION

The annual election was held at our Nov. 21st regular meeting. Incumbent members Lynn Hoffman & Glenn Wienke were reelected and Jim Ditzel, Gwen King & Pat Thompson were newly elected for a 3-year term to replace outgoing board members Dave Miller, Wes Miller & Dave Schmidt maintainig our board of trustees at 15 members. Our duly elected officers for 2018 were Bill Read, Pres; Paul Calkins, VP; Glenn Wienke, Treas.; Ruth Pirinelli, Recording Sec; & Gerry Treichler, Corresponding Sec., each to serve for 1 year. Your officers as well as the Trustees making up the Board are presented on the previous page herein. President Bill Read had appointed Ruth Pirinelli at our October Board meeting to replace Joan Shaw who had asked to step down as Recording Secretary but still remain on the Board.

BUILDING COMM.- Paul Calkins, Chair

Much has been accomplished by the Building Committee at the farm this year under the talented leadership of Chairman Paul Calkins and his committee Bill Read, Joan Shaw and Gerry Treichler. They worked with the architect to have a drawing prepared suitable to be presented to the Town of Lewiston Planning Board for approval of open items on the original site plan prepared at the start of construction of the Townsend Hall in 2010. After receiving approval of the Planning Board the committee prepared work descriptions and received quotes from various contractors. The low bid/winners were **Cooper Sign Co.** for the roadside sign; **Delorenzo Electric** for installing electric to sign and parking lot lights; Ken Young Paving for installing a 90-car stone parking lot, a 50ft road entry and a 10-car macadam area, widening and dressing all farm roads to 20ft width; John Plumbing and Lasalle Contracting for sewer installation; Ventry Concrete for sidewalk; and Jay Wendt Construction for installing street lights along the sidewalk.

The Building Committee is also monitoring the continuing work done on the schoolhouse by **Jay Wendt Construction** and Sheriff's work program workers.

The Parking Lot Project is 99% complete with the recent installation of street lights along the sidewalk between the Legion/Church Building and the Townsend Hall In the spring we will do landscaping to complete the project.

For the inside, we have received an estimate from **Jay Wendt Construction** on the wood work, trim and attic stairs work to be done this winter. The work to be done after **Jay** is finished is sanding and refinishing the floor in the main hall and installing new floors in the two smaller rooms. Also, we are attempting to get funds to setup the inside with our artifacts so that we can have our grand opening.

LANDSCAPE & CONSERVATION by Joan Shaw-731-5653

In 2006 SAHS initiated its memorial tree program whereby members could donate funds for a tree to be panted in memory of a loved one. An inscribed granite stone is placed at the base of the tree. Since then, twenty one trees have been planted in memory of loved ones. Ten Linden trees line the West entry road, five Oak trees grace the service road near the buildings, three Crab Apples grow in front of the Read Building, and two Red Maples highlight the Legion/Church building. Two tree donations are waiting for spring planting in front of the storage building. In addition we hope to plant two more trees there which will be available for donations in 2018. In years to come these beautiful trees will provide shelter for birds and shade for people during SAHS outdoor events.

A 2008 conservation agreement with the Niagara County Soil & Water District is due to expire in May 2018. Bill Read, Gerry Treichler, and Joan Shaw met with Mark Seider from the NCSW to discuss a plan for future maintenance of this acreage. SAHS will continue the maintenance program outlined in the agreement and will continue to monitor the pond and address the issue of invasive non- native reeds that have gained a foothold around it. The picture shows

wild flowers were

beautifully abundant in some areas, but others still need a boost. Wildflowers are essential to attract pollinating insects, butterflies, birds, and small wildlife. With this in mind, wild swamp milkweed has seen fit to plant itself in the west side garden at the Read building. It has flourished there for the past 3 summers and is poised to keep on spreading. There is evidence that Monarch butterflies have discovered it and are laying their eggs on the underside of the leaves.

Major construction at the Legion/Church building is complete. Soil has been graded around the building, and a new walkway has been installed to connect the Legion & Townsend buildings with four attractive lamp posts to light the way. To complete this picture, new shrub and flower bed landscaping around the Legion Bldg. will commence in the spring. Additional landscaping will enhance the Museum sign and selected areas near the parking lot.

Meanwhile, SAHS has much to look forward to in 2018. We are always looking to harness fresh energy from new and long-time members to carry on the work of the museums. Your unflagging support over the years has enabled the SAHS to accomplish great things in a short period of time! Every hour spent in this endeavor is important. Every contribution is heartily appreciated. These gifts to SAHS are irreplaceable. Thank you everyone! It's been a great year!

FORMING of Town of LEWISTON-1818

The Town of Lewiston was form from Cambria 200 years ago on February 29, 1818. The village of Sanborn in the Town of Lewiston was named after Ebenezer Sanborn in 1864. SAHS member Amy (Sanborn) Owen purchased two trees to be located in front of our Storage Building. One was in memory of her father Jere Lee Sanborn, and the other named in memory of her uncle, Lee Randall Sanborn Jr, all descendents of Ebenezer Sanborn.

CHANGE OF KEYS TO TOWNSEND HALL

GRANT REQUEST FROM SENATOR ROBERT ORTT

A letter application was sent to **State Senator Robert Ortt** requesting \$10,000 for living history sheds and \$60,000 for adding a shed on the side of the barn for tractor/equipment storage and for repairing the entry way to the cold storage building so the building can be used as an apple processing display.

HISTORY OF THE SANBORN AMERICAN LEGION BUILDING (Prepared by Gerald E. Treichler and reviewed as being accurate by Hope Methodist Church Historian and former Town of Lewiston Historian, Marcia Rivers.) Updated Dec 30, 2017

The Sanborn American Legion Post #969, Department of New York met with the Sanborn Area Historical Society (SAHS) and worked out an agreement to donate their property to SAHS After 59 years of ownership and the aging of their members, the Legion decided that it was time to downsize. The office of Attorney Joseph Leone Jr. prepared a deed finalizing the transfer of this property at 5866 Pearl Street effective March 15, 2012.


Research shows that this historic building was built in 1825/26 on a lot just south of the late John and Mildred Folmar's home at 5050 Townline Road located by the present Pekin Cut. It was built for use as a meetinghouse of the "First United Society of Methodist Episcopal Church of the Towns of Lewiston and Cambria" who had formed earlier on Dec. 18, 1824 when Pekin was known as Mountain Ridge. Documentation shows that the trustees sold the building to Philedus VanSlyke on June 19, 1856. This was about the time that the new stone "Methodist Episcopal Church" (now the Hope United Methodist Church) was constructed at the corner of Grove Street and Upper Mountain Road in Pekin. Both D. G. Beer's maps of 1860 and of 1875 show the Presbyterian Church on this lot. A manuscript on the history of Sanborn written circa 1936 by W. H. Daley states, "In 1865, an association was organized to procure a hall". A decision was made to secure the old wooden structure previously used as the early Methodist Church and later as a Presbyterian Church in Pekin. The steeple was removed and the building was moved to Sanborn. The building was called the Sanborn Union Hall. SAHS member, Janet (Hoover) Latham, reports in her Genealogy book that her great-grandfather, George Hoover, was part of a group instrumental in moving the building to Sanborn. She reports that the structure was possibly loaded onto log rollers and pulled by horses to its present location at 5866 Pearl Street in Sanborn.

A review of the Search for the Legion property shows that in 1875 a lot on Pearl St where the structure was placed was purchased from Lee R. Sanborn by the Sanborn Union Hall Association. According to church records, the First Methodist

Episcopal Church of Sanborn was organized on Feb. 8, 1868. Prior to the time that their new church was dedicated, on Sept. 20, 1874, they initially used their homes and then used the Sanborn Union Hall until their church was ready. This would mean that the building for the Sanborn Union Hall would have been moved on location prior to the 1875 date shown on the search records. The search also shows that the Reformed Mennonite Church of Williamsville owned the building for 48 years from 1888 when they purchased it from the Sanborn Union Hall Association until they sold it to the First Baptist Church of Sanborn in 1936. SAHS member Jeanette (Calkins) Hoffman remembers the Mennonite's from Lockport, North Tonawanda and other areas driving their buggy's and parking them out back of the building by a covered shed to attend church. Member Don Calkins remembers his father teaching a boy's Sunday school class in the building when it was owned by the Baptist.

The search shows that Gertrude M. Kline purchased the property from the Baptist Church on June 12, 1940. We have been informed that after the Sanborn American Legion was gifted the structure from the estate of Gertrude M. (Hoover) Kline in 1953, they had the front steps removed and extended the building 16 feet to house a kitchen and restrooms. This addition had a cellar under it to accommodate a furnace and a side entrance at grade level with steps inside leading up to the meeting room. The Legionnaires operated the building as a community hall providing a meeting place for their own members, the Lions Club, Friendship Club, Scuba Divers Club, Cub and Boy Scouts, Brownies, Girl Scouts, and other groups as well as for community and family functions as the need arose until they donated it to SAHS in March of 2012.

We are fortunate to be able to save this historic building that has serviced 5 churches and numerous civic groups over the past 192 years! SAHS has moved the building to its Farm Museum property at 2660 Saunders Settlement Road on October 2014 and restored it with a church steeple and steps and doors at the front of the building to replicate it like it was before being moved to Sanborn. We have also raised the floor to one level and added a ramp at the side door to make it handicap accessible. SAHS is now ready to setup the inside to house a church area and a veteran and other historical exhibit areas.
