#### **SOLAR PANELS**

As reported in our January 2020 Newsletter, our Board members at our December Board meeting were given a copy of a Letter of Intent to enter into an Option and Lease Agreement with 212 Solar Development, LLC a subsidiary of Borrego Solar Systems, Inc. of Latham, NY. President Bill went over the document in detail. He indicated that there was a potential for SAHS to receive an income of \$25,000 or more annually from the Solar Panel Project, depending on negotiated acres of panels. Currently there is a moratorium until July on installation of solar panels in the Town of Lewiston. After much discussion, a motion was made, seconded and unanimously carried for SAHS President William Read to sign the letter of intent for the installation of approximately 25 acres of solar panels with Borrego Solar System subsidiary, 212 Solar Development, LLC and represent the Board in further negotiations as necessary. He is also to sign the property owner consent for allowing these parties to work with National Grid.

After signing and submitting the December letter of intent documents, we are now gathering information on solar panel installations to identify if there are any issues to be addressed. We have recently received a proposed 25 year lease agreement for review. There will be a public meeting on the solar project as part of the process.

We are desperately in the need of additional funding to operate and maintain our museums as we have in the past. In March we borrowed on our Line-Of-Credit account with Key Bank to help pay the bills. You can see that we need to be more solvent and not go into more debt.

#### FARM LANDSCAPE & CONSERVATION-Bonnie Bagwell (731-3003:

**Bonnie Bagwel**l, our gardening committee chairman reports that the small spruce tree that was planted by the Read Building has been successfully transplanted to the circle garden out towards the barn where it will have room to grow to its proper size. Perennials and annuals will be planted around it. **Due to the Coronavirus** the Sheriff's work program has been postponed so their men will not be able to help clean up the beds at the farm as usual and we may have a late start to the planting. The great help we receive from the Key Bank employees is now scheduled for Thursday June4.

#### COVID-19 CORONAVIRUS CLINICAL INFORMATION- 12.March.2020 By Curtis T. Thompson, MD of CTALab (Modified to fit on page & updated by Gerald Treichler.)

#### This is the best thing to know.

Coronavirus infection does not cause a cold with a dripping nose or productive cough, but a dry throat and dry cough. The virus does resist heat and dies if exposed to temperatures of 80 degrees F: therefore often consume hot drinks such as tea, coffee. and broth during the day, or simply hot water: hot liquids neutralize the virus. and it is not difficult to drink them. Avoid drinking ice water or eating ice cubes. For those who can do it, expose yourself to the sun!

#### More information as follows:

1. The virus crown is quite large, so any type of mask can stop it: in normal life, special masks are not needed.. If an infected person sneezes in front of you,10 feet away they will drop the virus on the ground and prevent it from landing on you.

2. When the virus is found on metal surfaces, it survives from 12 hours up to 6 days. So when you touch metal surfaces such as handles, doors, appliances, supports on trams, etc., wash your hands vigorously for 20 seconds with a disinfectant solution with 60% alocohol.

3. The virus can live nested in clothes and fabrics for about 6/12 hours: normal detergents can kill it. For clothes that cannot be washed every day, if you can expose them to the sun and the virus will die.

#### How it clinically manifests:

1. The virus first installs itself in the throat, causing inflammation and a dry throat sensation: this symptom can last for 3 or 4 days.

2. The virus travels through the humidity present in the airways, descends into the trachea and installs in the lung, causing pneumonia. This step takes about 5 or 6 days.

3. Pneumonia occurs with high fever and difficulty breathing, it is not accompanied by the classic cold. But you may have the feeling of drowning. In this case, contact your doctor immediately.

#### How can you avoid COVID-19:

1. Virus transmission occurs mostly by direct contact, touching tissues or materials on which the virus is present: washing hands frequently is essential. The virus survives on your hands so many things can happen: rub your eyes or scratch your nose for example, and allow the virus to enter your throat. So, wash your hands very often and disinfect them!

You can gargle with a disinfectant solution that eliminates or minimizes the amount of virus that could enter your throat: in doing so, you eliminate it before it goes down into the trachea and then into the lungs.
Disinfect the PC keyboard and mobile phones.

**The new coronavirus NCP** may not show signs of infection for many days, before which it cannot be known if a person is infected. But by the time you have a fever and / or cough and go to the hospital, your lungs are usually already in 50% fibrosis and it's too late!

Taiwanese experts suggest doing a simple check that we can do on our own every morning as follows: Take a deep breath and hold your breath for more than 10 seconds. If you successfully complete it without coughing, without discomfort, a sense of oppression, etc., this shows that there is no fibrosis in the lungs, indicating essentially no infection. In such critical times, do this check every morning in a clean air environment! These are serious and excellent advice from Japanese doctors who treat COVID-19 cases. Everyone should make sure that their mouth and throat are moist, never dry. Drink a few sips of water often. WHY? Even if the virus gets into your mouth ... water or other liquids will sweep it away through the esophagus and into the stomach. Once in the belly ... The stomach gastric acid will kill all the virus. If you don't drink enough water more regularly ... the virus can get into your trumpets and lungs. It is very dangerous.

<u>BOTTOM LINE</u>- Stay home if you feel unwell. If you have a fever, cough and difficulty breathing, seek medical attention and call in advance. Follow the directions of your local health authority.
