Text below is by Ralph E, Casselman who came to Sanborn and established the Sanborn Home Telphone Company

**Glifford LeVan** lived in the house which has now been rebuilt into the Pekin Fire Hall. Mr. LeVan had a Green House at the rear of the building, he sold the place to Nicholson Bros. who enlarged the Green House and the one thing I remember about them was that they were the first in this section to raise sweet peas in the winter, as it was something a bit unusual they made a bunch of money the first year.

**Elmer & I** started for Sanborn and the snow banks were 4 or 5 ft. high over by Sam Treichler's. The road had been shoveled out only one lane and we got in there and met a team of horses, and as we had only one horse on the cutter Elmer had to unhitch the horse and turn the cutter around and hitch the horse on again and drive back as I stood up on the bank freezing.

He was going to an orchestra rehearsal, so there were horns, music racks, robes, blankets etc. That's the price we had to pay for a pleasant evening, 65 years ago.

**Elmer** used to hitch up a team of horses on a bob sleigh fill the sleigh with straw and we'd

start for Lockport to do our Christmas shopping which included dolls, doll buggy, candy etc.

We'd heat soap stones to keep our feet warm (they're up in our attic now), hold up umbrella to keep from freezing and start on an eight mile ride which took over an hour. -

We'd put the horses in at Hawks Livery Stable, take off our extra wraps and walk over the big Bridge to the stores and walk back with our arms full of Christmas gifts & warm clothing for Winter.

Some difference today, This was 65 years ago.

**The "Church Supper"** was the center of the social life of the church and the members of the church were 'supposed to attend.

It was and is a very important social aspect of the church, you meet other members of the church informally as well as those who are not members. The church soon becomes known as a friendly place by the type of "Church Supper" served.

Not only the older members but the young

people learn to serve, to enjoy coming together and working together for the betterment of the community. -

The "Church Supper" may time never dim its importance. ""

**This last** snow makes me think of the storm we had in April 1936.

It began in the afternoon about three and by five when men started to come home from work, the roads were blocked. Some who had started home were stuck in the snow and could not get thru". The two girls at the switchboard had a hard time getting calls thru, at times the Falls operator could not take any more calls as all toll lines were busy.

The girls handled 130 toll calls in one hour, it was a busy time and continued to be for the next two or three days.

### **SPEED & MORE SPEED**

Remember when, if you wished to go to Lockport or Niagara Falls you either drove a horse or took the train, those days we had 4 passenger trains each way every day, either way it took hours to make the trip. I repeat, those days you had to have patience which was and is good for the health and happiness, for today I believe one of the greatest problems of our time is the impatience of the general public especially our young people. A great many accidents on our roads where people are killed are caused by the impatience of the driver.

Impatience, then speed, then death. Be patient, it is far better than hustle, bustle and bust.

John Batt had a greenhouse on the property where Carpenter now lives in Pekin, although the greenhouse was small, John did real well for several years.

George Dunbar also had a greenhouse below the hill just off the old hill road. George raised tomato plants in large numbers for many years. LeVan had a greenhouse back of what is now the fire hall, they are now all gone, the only one at Pekin now of any size is the one Andrew Fellows built and is now owned by Mr. Groth.

**The following** are a few of the boys who have left Sanborn to go out and make their mark in the world, who I can remember as little boys about town a few years ago.

I see by the paper that it is planned to make a parking garage under the Ellicott Square Building in Buffalo. I wonder how many there are that can remember that back in 1912 that the basement under this building was restaurant and the charge for a complete mean was 25 cents and it was a good meal, it was operated for a number of years and became quite famous. I always planned to get dinner there every time I was in Buffalo. How many others remember doing the same.

I remember when State Highway Maintenance was down by two men and a horse and wagon.

When I first came to Sanborn the road from Sanborn to St. Johnsburg was a narrow black top and edges of the road would become badly broken up, repair men would come along with the wagon and a few bushels of black top repair and endeavor to fix the bad spots. It was a continuous job and they were at it every good day all summer long.

**I was** talking to Walter Baker the other day and he asked me how long I had lived in Sanborn, When I told him it was some 49 years he said "I Just can 't believe it is that long" he went on to say he was 80 years old and that it did not seem possible that he was that old or that he had seen that many years pass.

As memory travels backward and the years are counted, it certainly seems impossible that there are so many.

**One year** there were a number of trigger happy hunters who blasted away at anything and everything, were hunting just to make noise rather than shoot game. One of Albert Jagow's cows was hit by a charge of shot, another farmer had chickens shot and so it went.

Today there is less of that sort of thing, but there is always a danger when a gun gets into the hands of the irresponsible.

As I have stated before few people realize the day today, month to month and year to year changes that take place. For example when I came to Sanborn there

were no houses on the East side of the road from Saunders Settlement road to the Methodist Church, and on the West side only Griff Sanborn's now the Johnson's house. Over the years the same thing has happened along every road in this section. What will take place in the next fifty years?

**One Christmas** time before the days when you could use your Auto in winter, to go Christmas shopping you took the train.

My wife, the kids and I went to Lockport to do a little shopping and it took more time than we planned as the kids were small and could not walk very fast. while we were out there it began to snow very hard, it was slow going walking back to the depot and we almost missed the train home, but were lucky and very thankful to get home as the storm increased and no trains ran for two days.

Those were the days.

Yes, Mrs Elmer Crosier remembers the dirt roads and snow banks s 4 to 5 ft high. In the Spring the big road scraper came and everybody was excited and pleased to see the roads graded for Summer so we could hitch our horses on our two seated carriage and take a ride.

Then how we hated to see it rain for that meant mud and a dirty buggy to wash.

Things never changed, Mr. Dewey Timothy had a store where Mr. & Mrs. Geo. Johnson now live. and across the street Howard Clancy has the store that was formerly owned by Joseph Parker.

Then we go on to the parking lot on the corner where Mr. Frank Williams had a store and across the street, Richard McCarthy occupied the Hotel and next door was the home of Mrs. Schmeck mother of Irving Schmeck where she had the post Office this was in 1893 when I taught school in Pekin. Then up the street is the good old Methodist Church where people still worship. Note, I am very glad to have anyone send in a Remember When" at any time.

**Doctor Plain,** who's funeral was Sunday, was one of my very good friends. I have known him since shortly after I came to Sanborn and my wife knew him even before we were married.

He was a very kind and thoughtful man. The way we first met, he had heard that I was building a telephone plant in the Sanborn – Pekin section, and he stopped in at the office to wish me well and to say that as he had patients in the area, it would be very helpful to be able to reach them by phone.

From that time on we were friends and it was easy to be friendly with him, always pleasant, a good word for one and all.

When I came to Sanborn in 1912 nearly all the roads around Sanborn were dirt roads and you had dust in the summer, mud in the fall and spring, and snow in the winter. Roads were not ploughed in the winter. If you wished, to go any place in the winter you went with horse and sleigh.

"It seems impossible today that roads were ever like that, but there are a number of people still who can remember those good old slow days, even after the coming of the auto you put the car away for the winter. We had teen-agers then but they stayed home at least some of the time.

**Every local** merchant filled his show windows with all kinds of fire-works a few days before the Fourth. All sizes of firecrackers, sky rockets, roman candles and many other items to delight kids of all ages and size. If you went to Lockport, Tonawanda, or Niagara Fal1s just before the fourth there would be many special booths on the side walks with fire-works for sale The town sounded like a machine gun on the fourth with every kid setting off firecrackers. Of course a few got burned, so the powers that be have ruled that kids can't do so anymore, but it sure was fun while it lasted. Now kids have to wait until they are teenagers and can take Dads \$3000 car and knock themselves out instead of burning their fingers with a five cent bunch of fircrackers. The Post Office was in Pike's Store and Frank McCann (Skip) met the trains, carried the mail from the depot to the office in a two wheeled cart or in the winter on a big sled.

Once in a while Skip would forget and go to the depot without the cart, both Pike & the Station Master had to explain to Skip that the cart was quite necessary to have along.

Skip and his cart was a common sight for many years and the mail went thru regardless of "snow or rain" but Skip was never in a hurry. Those were the days.

The years roll by and become so many that it

seems impossible that there number is so great. Just to name a few I can remember when the following were married:

Norm LeVan, Morris LeVan, Don Calkins, Lloyd Treichler, Wilbur Treichler, Ralph Treichler, Wallace Bush, Edwin Hoover, Howard Clancy, George Stover, Allen Flack, Francis Durffy, Jonas Haseley and many more. Seems like just about all the married people have been married in the last 50 years that I have lived in Sanborn.

The clock ticks and time moves on, the grains of sand in the hour glass of life run out.

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**Charlie Bridgeman and Albert Bridgeman** had the Greenhouse now run by Ingraham. They also worked a large section of the muck land. The one thing I remember about the working of this muck land was that they were the first to use a rotary plow. This plow had a large revolving disk and it not only turned a wide furrow it would cut thru roots and make plowing much faster & easier.

Another Decoration Day comes and goes, little do each of us know just what it means to the other fellow.

When I was a small boy I can remember there were quite a number of Civil War Veterans that would march, my father was one, but the number steadily decreased, then there were some Spanish war men added. Even after I came to Sanborn there were a few Civil War men who marched, then World War One men were added, and now World War Two are in line and Civil War boys are gone along with most of the Spanish War Men of 1898. They banish our anger forever when they laurel the graves of our dead.
